

The Lania Story

Lania (officially *Laneia*) is one of the most historically rich and visually distinctive villages in the Limassol district — a place where Cyprus's Bronze Age past, medieval legends, and deep winemaking heritage all converge. The core takeaway: **Lania is one of Cyprus's oldest continuously inhabited wine-villages, with settlement evidence dating back to around 1600 BC, renowned for its traditional architecture, ancient wine presses, and strong cultural identity.**



Identity & Location

- A traditional mountain village at **575 m elevation** on the foothills of the Troodos range, about **25–26 km northwest of Limassol**.
- Population: **281 residents (2011 census)**.
- Official spelling: **Laneia**, though locals overwhelmingly use **Lania**.



Deep Historical Roots

- Archaeological evidence suggests habitation **as early as 1600 BC**, linked to copper transport from the Troodos mines.
- Excavations in nearby Alassa support the idea that Lania sat on a copper-transport route during the Late Bronze Age.
- Medieval period: inhabited during the Lusignan era; the **12th-century Church of St. Catherine** is a surviving landmark.



Winemaking Heritage

Lania is one of Cyprus's major historic wine villages — a **koumantarochori**.

- Famous for **Commandaria**, **Zivania**, and **Soutzoukos**.
- Home to authentic **Lin**os (ancient wine presses) and large terracotta jars used for wine storage.
- Traditional origin of the name: from **Lana**, daughter of Dionysus, the Greek god of wine.
- Alternative etymology: from **valania** (acorns), referencing the once-abundant oak trees.

A famous legend claims that healthy vines from Lania were shipped to France to help replant Champagne's vineyards after disease devastated them.



Architecture & Atmosphere

- Narrow stone alleys, wooden doors, bougainvillea-lined courtyards, and preserved traditional houses.
- The village maintains a strong artistic identity, hosting **galleries and studios** for local and international artists.
- The **old fountain** at the entrance remains a symbol of village life.

Religious & Cultural Sites

- **Panagia Eleousa / Panagia Valana:** central church with the ancient Icon of Saint Mary of Valanas, considered one of the oldest icons in Cyprus.
- **Chapels of Agios Georgios and Agia Marina,** set among vineyards and fields.
- **Commandaria Storage Museum,** old olive press, shoemaker's workshop — all preserved as cultural exhibits.

Natural Heritage

- Historically home to the **Royal Oak**, a legendary centuries-old tree near Agios Georgios. Though no longer standing, it remains part of village lore.

Festivals & Community Life

- **“Lanes and Courtyards of Lania”** (May): residents open their homes, gardens, and workshops to visitors — one of the most beloved cultural events in the Limassol mountains.
- Known for exceptional hospitality, cleanliness, and preservation of traditional crafts.

Getting There

- **Bus Line 60** from Limassol (approx. 43 minutes, ~€4).
- Taxi: **€30–€40**, ~24 minutes from Limassol.

Historical Timeline of Lania

Bronze Age (c. 1600–1050 BC)

Early Byzantine (AD 330–650)

- Establishment of early Christian worship sites.
- The icon of **Panagia Valana** is traditionally believed to originate from this era or slightly later.

Middle Byzantine to Frankish/Lusignan (AD 650–1489)

- Lania is documented as a functioning rural village.
- Construction of the **Church of St. Catherine** (12th century), one of the oldest surviving structures.
- Vineyards expand; Lania becomes part of the **Commandaria region**, supplying grapes to feudal estates.

Venetian Period (1489–1571)

- Increased taxation on wine production; Lania’s economy remains stable due to high-quality grapes.
- Defensive architecture in the region improves; Lania retains its open-plan layout.

Ottoman Period (1571–1878)

- Population grows slowly; houses built in stone with wooden upper floors.
- Wine production continues; **Zivania** distillation becomes widespread.
- The **Royal Oak** near Agios Georgios becomes a local landmark and gathering point.

British Colonial Period (1878–1960)

- Introduction of modern road networks; Lania becomes more accessible.
- Artistic and craft traditions flourish — weaving, shoemaking, metalwork.
- The old **village fountain** is rebuilt and becomes a central social space.

Republic of Cyprus (1960–present)

- Preservation efforts begin in the 1980s; Lania becomes known as one of Cyprus's most picturesque villages.
- Growth of artist studios, heritage museums, and cultural festivals.
- The annual “**Lanes and Courtyards of Lania**” festival becomes a major cultural event.
- Today: a living heritage village with strong identity, meticulous upkeep, and deep community pride.

Village Core (Central Lania)

1. Panagia Valana Icon (Interior of Panagia Eleousa Church)

“The ancient icon of Panagia Valana, venerated for centuries by the people of Lania. Its darkened pigments and Byzantine features reflect deep continuity of worship in the Troodos foothills.”

2. Old Village Fountain

“The stone fountain at the entrance of Lania, once the village’s main water source. A meeting point for generations, it remains one of the most recognizable symbols of the community.”

3. Traditional Linos (Wine Press)

“A preserved stone wine press used for Commandaria production. The adjoining terracotta jars (pitharia) illustrate the scale of historic winemaking in Lania.”

4. Shoemaker’s Workshop

“A small museum preserving the tools and benches of Lania’s traditional shoemakers. Leatherwork was once a vital craft in the village’s daily life.”

5. Agios Georgios Chapel

“A quiet rural chapel surrounded by vineyards and olive groves. The site is closely associated with the memory of the Royal Oak, a legendary tree that once dominated the landscape.”

6. Artist’s Courtyard

“One of Lania’s many artist courtyards, where stone walls, wooden doors, and flowering vines create a natural gallery space. A testament to the village’s modern creative identity.”

7. Vineyard Terraces (Eastern Sector)

“Terraced vineyards rising toward the Troodos foothills. These slopes have supported viticulture since the Bronze Age, forming the backbone of Lania’s agricultural heritage.”
